NICHOLAS SPENCE

Nicholas Spence was killed tragically in a horrific motor accident on the M90 while he was driving to work on the morning of 19th October 1992. He was struck head-on by a vehicle which had gone out of control and crossed the central reservation. He was 50 years of age.

Nick was in many ways a model Former Pupil. He overcame early disappointment when his original ambition to join the Navy was thwarted by his failure to pass the medical Instead he became an apprentice examination. Bristol aviation works, and it was there that he began to forge an extremely successful career in the aircraft and defence industries. During his entire career he kept faithfully in touch with his old school and contributed regularly to our magazine. We remember an article describing his activities at the Bristol factory, another describing the test firing of a missile, yet another with details of his work in Munich where he was involved not only with an international consoritium cooperating in aircraft production, but also in education as president the Parent/Teacher Association of the International School there. Following this he moved to Ankara, where he represented a large number of companies in the GEC/Marconi group, and it was from his base in Turkey that he returned to contribute, as one of the speakers, to the success of our 1991 Biennial Dinner.

Nick had since then been appointed to a post as Head of European Marketing for GEC/Ferranti and had only recently returned to Scotland to set up house in Abernethy (near Perth) with his wife Margaret (née MacLennan) whom he married some three years ago.

To Margaret, who has had to face this appalling tragedy which has come upon her so soon after her marriage to Nick, to Shona and Jamie, Nick's children from his previous marriage, and to his stepdaughter Catherine we send the sincerest sympathy on behalf of our members.

Nick was buried in Carrbridge Cemetery in the grave next to that of Margaret's father, the late Hugh MacLennan who will have been known to many of our members as the former policeman at Carrbridge.

LOCAL NEWS

If one is seeking confirmation of the theory that global warming is occurring, the evidence from Grantown's weather over the past year is quite difficult to interpret. Still on an environmental tack, we have been pleased to see the success of the local bottle banks (the Grantown one is in the Burnfield car park) and we hope that the provision of collection points for drinks cane do as well. Local builders McLeods are building a central compound for them at the

The walk by the Kylintra Burn downstream from the Silver Bridge has been considerably improved by drainage work, the construction of two bridges over the burn and the planting of a large number of trees on the marshy meadow adjoining the Cemetery Wood. Grant Park promises to become a very interesting and attractive amenity area once the effect of the new planting can be fully seen.

The hard times for farming and business show little sign of coming to an end and, just after New Year, came the news of the impending closure of Balmenach distillery and the Pittyvaich plant ae well. These are bound to have

considerable repercussions over quite a wide area.

And on a much more constructive note, the various steps taken to commemorate the contribution to the life of the area by Karl Fuchs, the late ski-ing pioneer. A considerable sum hae already been gathered towards the construction of a dry ski slope in the Glenmore area.

In the sphere of local football Grantown has enjoyed a vintage year, collecting McLean, Capaldi and Cruickshank Cups in the process, and breaking United's run of four in a row as

the McLean Cup is concerned.

"Old-timers" among our members will no doubt have been struck by two recent developments in the school activities: rugby has reappeared on the PE curriculum, and in each of the past three years there has been a theatrical production.

IN THE INTER-WAR YEARS

MEMORIES GRAVE AND GAY.

MY FIRST DAY AT GRANTOWN GRAMMAR SCHOOL. I was aged eight when I transferred from Dulnain to Grantown School, and only the day before school opened, a bicycle was bought for me at "Shaw's" (later "Boyd's") at the top end of the High Street. It was ridden home to Dulnain by my elder sister, and I had then to learn to ride it following day. All went well on my first trip until I reached the steep brae at the bottom of the High Street. I had almost reached the top when, distracted by a crowd of boys at the end of a close, I fell off! The jeers of the onlookers were quickly stilled by the arrival of a "knight errant", the biggest boy in the group - Willie Laing, who came to my rescue, picked up my bike, and walked with me up the hill. Dear Willie - many years later, when he was the farmer of Gaich, he would often chat to the nannie who took my younger sister out in her pram. They married... and Jean and he lived happily ever after.

A TRAGIC ACCIDENT. The spot where I fell off my bicycle was the scene only two or three years later of a fatal accident, when the little girl Ledingham was knocked down and killed by a car. Was this, I wonder, Grantown's first road accident fatality?

THE DANGEROUS SPEY. Another tragedy involved the Silver boys, three brothers who lived with their parents at Broom Cottage, opposite Craggan Mill. One very warm summer day the three boys went down to the Spey to bathe, and only one returned. Nowhere on the Spey is safe for

bathing.

ANOTHER KNIGHT ERRANT. In my early days at Dulnain Bridge School I was fortunate to find another rescuer when, in the playground, I became entangled in some barbed wire. This brought about a large and embarrassing tear in the seat of my trousers! I remember standing in confusion with my back to the wall, suffering the guffaws of my classmates, till Chad Ross appeared and took me in to Miss Cameron, who did a running repair with safety pins!

OF TEACHERS AND SPORTS ACTIVITIES In Grantown we were blessed with sympathetic teachers, under the Rector Mr. MacLennan - Miss Lawson, dear old Miss MacGregor and Miss Campbell - then on to the Higher Grade. Here, for most boys, the centre of the universe was a newcomer, Wilson. Arriving about 1928, he transformed the sporting life of the school. We suddenly found to our delight, not only football being organized, but also new games - rugby and cricket - and the necessary equipment provided. Athletics too blossomed for the first time, and to encourage competition, the House system was initiated and the Old Guard Club set up. Icobel Crant of Ballinluig was the outstanding athlete of my time...thank goodness I never had to race against her!

CONTEMPORARIES. Grizel Dean of Advie, Ella Wood and Jack Cooke of Cromdale, Ian Forbes of Connage - and two who sadly were early casualties of the war...quiet, modest and industrious Harry Fraser of Nethybridge and John Laing. Edwin Munro figures on the Dux Board, and though John Milne, Jimmie McLeod and Jock Paterson do not, all three have done their teachers proud in later life. I remember how Jimmie was unlucky enough to lose a finger in a crash while sledging on the 14th fairway, and it was about that time that his father (or was it Jock's father? The memory plays tricks!) became "world famous" as far as we boys were concerned by skipping the Royal Carsebreck Bonspiel Team.

PERSEVERANCE in ADVERSE WEATHER - A GGS TRADITION! No matter how severe the weather, we could never leave school before 4pm. With very heavy constalls we were With very heavy snowfalls we school before 4pm. occasionally forced to leave our bicycles at the old LMS station and walk home to Dulnain along the railway line. The bus service did not appear till I was about 12. Yet on the only two occasions when I figured on the prize list, it was for... "perfect attendance"!

PLAYING FOR DULNAIN TEAMS. I confess I found football much more interesting than Science or Latin! At one time the GGS team had six boys from Dulnain: two Mackintosh cousins, two Ross brothers, Donnie Fraser and myself, so it follows that at that time Dulnain had the best boys team in the Strath. A later memory is of a MacNiven Cup final at Tomintoul after which we attended the village
