GRANTOWN GRAMMAR COMMUNITY SPORTS COMPLEX



Artist's impression of the new Community Sports Complex.

Work began in October 2005 on providing a £2.4 million Community Sports Complex at Grantown Grammar School.



Local Highland Councillor Basil Dunlop was joined by retired solicitor, Gordon McCulloch, former provost and town clerk of the town, to cut the first turfs of the project, which will feature a 4badminton court sports hall, a new gym and field sports changing rooms, fitness suite and dance studio. In addition to this a reception area will link all facilities including access to the swimming pool.

Both Councillor Dunlop and Mr McCulloch are former Chairpersons of the original Steering Group which started the community project in 1988. This became the Strathspey Leisure and Recreational Trust which, led by Mr McCulloch, progressed the project and raised substantial local funding. In 2002 changes in national funding criteria required The Highland Council's Education, Culture and Sport Service to sponsor the project. Project Management will be undertaken by the 'in house' Property and Architectural Service (PAS).

The design by architect, Nick Taylor, PAS, includes a strong element of sustainable design, which has high insulation, natural ventilation, the use of technologies such as ground source heat pumps and timber cladding.

Funding for the project has been received from the Big Lottery Fund £931,122, sportscotland £300,000 and Inverness, Nairn, Badenoch and Strathspey Enterprise £120,000 and the Strathspey Leisure and Recreation

Trust have contributed £100,000 which has been raised through many years hard work fund-raising in the local community. The Highland Council met the balance of £950,000.

There has also been consultation with Grantown Grammar School and the Grantown Golf Club and their input, along with that of the Strathspey Leisure Recreational Trust, has been a significant factor in attracting the external funding without which it would not have been possible to develop this project.

The facility will be operated by the Council's Education, Culture and Sport Service under a formal School/Community Management agreement.

The contract has been awarded to Les Taylor Contracts and the facility should be open by October, next year.

Councillor, Basil Dunlop said: ""I am delighted that we have finally reached this important day - it has been a long haul. This will be a major asset to the area, a superb indoor sport and leisure centre which will be a much appreciated and well-used community facility. I would like to thank the funding bodies, Highland Council staff, my fellow Trustees and the Grantown community for all their support and hard work in achieving this."

Grantown Grammar School Rector Malcolm MacLennan said: "Schools and Community in the Grantown-on-Spey area have always been extremely sport-conscious. The Sports Hall will be a tremendous asset and it will enable people of all ages to access a much greater range of healthy activities – this will benefit us all."

David Campbell, Big Lottery Fund Scotland Board Member, said: "This new sports facility at Grantown Grammar School is fantastic news not only for young people in Grantown but also the wider community. The Big Lottery Fund wants to open new opportunities for people to take part in sport and outdoor activity in fun and innovative ways. That's why we need more facilities like this in Scotland where people of all ages, abilities and backgrounds, are encouraged to take part in healthy activities."

Julia Bracewell OBE, Chair of sportscotland, said: "sportscotland is delighted to be supporting the creation of the new sports complex at Grantown Grammar School, which will see both the school and local community benefit from a major new sports facility. This project is another example of sportscotland's commitment to providing communities across Scotland with quality, accessible facilities, to ensure that more people have the opportunity to be more active, more often."

Ian Findlay, Chairman of Strathspey Leisure Recreational Trust, said: "Members of the Trust are delighted that after many years the dream of a modern leisure complex has now come true. This is a much needed facility for the Strathspey area that we are sure will be well used. There have been many difficulties over the years but these have been overcome and we would like to pay particular thanks to the local community who had given unstinting support to the many fund-raising events that the Trust have organised."

Stuart Black, chief executive of Inverness, Nairn, Badenoch and Strathspey Enterprise said: "We are very pleased to be able to assist with this ambitious and exciting project. The new sports complex will provide much needed indoor facilities for a wide range of activities that can be used all year round, which will be a great asset for Grantown Grammar and the wider community."

THE 2005 BIENNIAL REUNION

Like in 2003 the response by members to the invitation to attend the 2005 Reunion was marvellous! Shortly after 7.30 pm on Saturday 9 April 2005 some 68 Former Pupils, wives, partners and friends were safely seated in The Ben Mhor Hotel, Grantown – ready for the Biennial General Meeting.

Added to the Committee for the first time were Angus Mackintosh, Sandy McCook and Stewart Grant and the members warmly welcomed their introduction.

Members were informed that a supply of Old Guard Ties – in scarlet and silver, of course, had been obtained and that some 12 of these were on view! Bill Templeton would hold the remaining stock and would welcome further purchases! At £5 each the ties were regarded as a real bargain. Reference was made to the enjoyable and informative tour of the Grammar School by some 14 members earlier in the day. Members were also reminded about the informal golf outing on the Grantown course on the Sunday morning at 10 am and the meeting was informed that a further arrangement had been made for a visit to the Old School – now the Grantown on Spey Primary School - at 3 pm on Sunday 10th.

There was no further business and the meeting was brought to a close at 7.55 pm.

MEMORIES OF IAIN SMITH (1932-2005) (Contributed by a friend Bruce Morgan)

Many readers will already know that Iain Smith, known at school as "Steak", died on 5th March 2005.

Iain was born in Grantown-on-Spey on 16th January 1932. At school he was captain of his House and later, the school. A keen and able sportsman he captained the school football, cricket and athletic teams. Along with his teenage friends, Iain enjoyed "out of school" socialising in Bertie Grant's Billiard Room where his talent also shone, causing the amusing comment that it was there he acquired his Higher Leaving Certificate!

On leaving school he looked to the Royal Navy for a future but the life didn't suit him. National Service came along when he was drafted into "The Seaforths" and was based at Chepstow. Following that, he returned to Grantown but failing to find satisfying employment in the town he loved, he tried for the London Metropolitan Police in 1955 and was accepted. The camaraderie of the job particularly suited him, making the next 28 years happy and fulfilling. Starting his police career in London's East End, Iain had many fascinating stories of his experiences in this area. He also worked through the violent protests of the 60's, including the Grosvenor Square Riots. The National Press at the time featured a photograph of him calmly carrying bottles of milk to assist a lady he escorted home through the mayhem.

In 1957 Iain married Joan Fraser, a fellow pupil of the Grantown Grammar School, and they set up home in North London. They had two of a family, Fraser and Joanne, who gave them four grandchildren. In 1991 Iain and Joan returned to the Highlands to make their holiday croft in Lentran near Beauly, a permanent home for retirement. As a hobby, Iain had his own flock of sheep. Shepherding gave him the fresh air and exercise he enjoyed. He was a member of the Inverness Field Club and a keen supporter of Eden Court.

Although living away from Grantown for many years Iain was always interested in his home town, making many happy return visits and keeping up old friendships.

Sadly, he suffered from cancer in his last few years, braving his illness with courage and cheerfulness. The funeral service was in his church in Beauly, where he was an elder, and the interment was at Grantown New Cemetery.

Excerpt from a letter received by John Stuart From former Grantonian Frederick Lionel McMillan

I am writing this letter out of the blue, as the saying goes, after so many years of no communication. Our generation in Grantown is getting sparse so it is nice to feel there is a few to remember and keep in touch with, old age does make us that bit more sentimental. I vaguely remember a short spell before the war when you associated with my brother Jimmie and I as boys. I also remember you after the war and how shattered you were after your horrific experience in the RAF so now in your present condition it is up to the country to look after you. John, I hope you will make some recovery from the injury to your spinal cord. I am not giving an impression of sophistication by typing this letter, the secret is I am a poor speller and this word processing system of computer does not allow wrong spelling. If I did this in long hand I would show my true failure from Grantown Grammar school. I am afraid old Tom Hunter and his crew did not do much for me. My wife, being of a considerably higher academic standard than me, passed her ability to our only daughter who has attained a degree Bachelor of Education Honours degree and has been teaching in schools in Germany and Hong Kong and in this country for over 30 years. It is 55 years since I left Grantown. One thing that has always amused me about our countrymen, that is, if a Scot emigrates to Canada

or Australia, or some such country, when he returns to Scotland he will most likely be greeted with an air of cordiality and some interest about where he lives, but if you have gone to England in so many cases you receive a rather flat response. However, I am not implying that is the attitude throughout but it is noticeably quite general. I think of Grantown as a nice little place to live but so like many other small towns for young school leavers the opportunities are very limited. I was in and out of work for three years after coming back from war service, until I got a rehabilitation course for engineering which I did in Glasgow. When that was completed I returned to Grantown and called in at the Labour Exchange to see Jim Winchester, who informed me that there was nothing he could offer in the engineering line, and his words were "to go south". There and then I asked him to phone the Labour Exchange in Devises in Wiltshire where my wife came from, which he did and immediately he got me a position with what turned out to be a nice little engineering company. Things went well and I never looked back. The English people have always been receptive and sociable and after 18 years I had bought my own house and opened my own engineering shop which I called "Mechanical Services" and about the same time my wife took a lease on an Inn, so we sold our house and moved to the Inn where my wife mostly employed part time young married women who wanted a job with flexible hours. It was a very busy place where it took over 30 dinner, bed and breakfast customers every night. I retired in 1989 and sold out to a big Bristol company. We enjoyed our life and met lots of interesting and odd characters. We managed a holiday back to Grantown but we had never been overseas until after we retired so we went all out to see as much of the world as possible visiting Canada, Austria, Italy, France, Hong Kong, Singapore, Australia, New Zealand and the Gambia in west Africa. In New Zealand we met an American lady who had the name Grant and had been to Grantown to trace ancestry whom she said lived on a farm near Carrbridge. In Vancouver we met a distant relative who produced a scroll on which was the McMillan family tree dating back to 1792. Another relative was Train whose mother was a McMillan and it turned out that his American father was a brother of Jack Train who acted the drunken colonel in the radio programme ITMA with Tommy Handley. He traced the McMillan line and gave me information which I had not the remotest knowledge of such as our great grandfather ran a horse bus service in Aberdeen running between such places as Aberchirder, Huntly, Turriff and several other villages which he started in about 1876 and married a Margaret McDougal. We now live in Weymouth which has a nice atmosphere and plenty going on. The British Legion parade held once a year is always a big affair with as many as five military bands, two of which are always pipe bands. It is not uncommon to see someone in the kilt on Weymouth streets and on odd occasions someone playing the bagpipes, so being right down on the south coast of England does not mean we lose all our Scottish touches. I do notice that the pipe bands always gets that little extra applause which is down to the swagger "O" the kilt, tartan and Scottish style.
